### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Emma Williams, our Museum curator was successful in 2011 in obtaining a grant of \$4,000 from The Community Heritage Program. These funds were earmarked for a Significance Assessment of the Australian Golf Heritage Museum collection. This Assessment was completed in March this year by Veronica Bullock of Significance International after a very comprehensive survey of the Museum's collection. This report will be of great importance to the Museum as the exhibits become more and more valuable in their representation of that part of the history of the game of golf. This report has formed the basis of a request to The Community Heritage Program 2012 for further funding. Further details of the Assessment are in this edition.

Our Board, at the February meeting, appointed Mrs Margery McWilliam OAM to join Dan Cullen DFC and Kel Nagle AM as our Patrons. Marg McWilliam has made a very significant contribution to the administration of Women's Golf at Club, State and National level and was awarded the Order of Australia for her services to golf. I would like to invite and encourage all Members to participate in this golfing event and to experience the game of golf, with hickories, in a national championship.

Interestingly, in the December 2011 edition of *Through the Green*, there was a conversion determined by the British Golf Collectors Society for the calculation of handicaps when playing with hickories. After much analysis across players of different handicaps playing in different events the following conversion factors were approved by the Society

Add 3 shots for scratch to 3 handicap  
Add 4 shots for 4 to 8 handicap  
Add 5 shots for 9 to 14 handicap  
Add 6 shots for 15 to 20 handicap  
Add 7 shots for 21 handicap and upwards.

These provisions apply to players in hickory competitions or matches, whose handicaps have been based on play with modern equipment.

## AGHS MUSEUM RECEIVES OSSIE PICKWORTH'S CLUBS

On Monday 22nd May, 2012 Bruce Nairn and I met with Ossie Pickworth's son Robert, who presented The Museum with the set of clubs Ossie used to win the 1954 Australian Open in Adelaide. These clubs were made by PGF Precision Golf Forging Co. in Sydney. The irons are forged blades with "S" (stiff) steel shafts, numbered 2 through 9. The 4 woods 1,2,3 and 4 are Persimmon with inlay faces and once again "S"(stiff) steel shafts. The steel shafted blade putter has the original one piece composition grip which is



## AGHS MUSEUM *Significant Article*

As previously reported The Australian Golf Heritage Society's Museum application for a Community Heritage Grant in 2011 was successful and an amount of \$4,000 was received. These funds were to be used for an independent Significance Assessment of the Museum's collection. To this end Significance International were contracted to undertake the assessment which was conducted by Veronica Bullock.

Members may recall an article by Ann Crisp in the September 2006 edition of *The Brassie* which was a report on the Significance workshop held at the Parramatta Heritage Centre. Ann writes :-

"Significance is the key in deciding on the objects to keep in a Collection. What special qualities make an object worth collecting, worth displaying and interesting to know about? What objects would you not collect or display and not even accept if they were offered to you? Provenance - who owned it, used it, made it, and more - allows its significance to be assessed. If an object is offered without Provenance then perhaps it should not be accepted. If you collect everything you might not have a clear idea of 'Significance' which:

- describes the collectibility of an object
- is a method of evaluating objects based on criteria for rarity, condition, usage, etc
- should be a collaborative issue, not just determined by one person
- allows critical decisions about why we retain, accept or reject an item

Having a good understanding of Significance helps to get rid of rubbish e.g. six of the same thing is unnecessary, although by accepting quite a few of the same, you may find that one of them is an especially Significant item because of its quality, who owned it or used it.

...Significance is closely linked to Conservation and the wrong approach to Conservation can destroy the Significance of an object. For example, books are part of the whole picture. Do not repair books unless they are to be used over and over. Otherwise they will get further from being truly Significant.

...Provenance (story) refers to an object's life history, how/where it was used, chain of ownership, if genuine, authenticity etc."

This excellent background excerpt allows us to more fully appreciate the Executive Summary below provided by Veronica Bullock of the Significance Assessment of the Australian Golf Heritage Society:

*"This (Significance Assessment) report identifies key elements of the significance of the Australian Golf Heritage Society (AGHS) collection using the significance assessment methodology recommended in Significance 2.0: a guide to assessing the significance of collections (2009)*

almost worn away. Ossie was certainly one of the world's best putters. All the clubs are housed in a 9" black solid kangaroo hide bag. This also shows great wear and has had the strap repaired.

We regard this set as a priceless piece of Australia's golfing history. Many thanks to Robert and the Pickworth family.

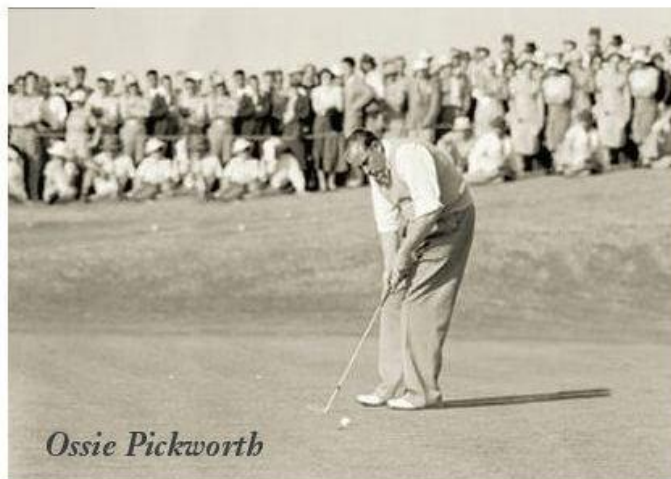
## AGHS MUSEUM *Significant Article* (CONT.)

*The AGHS collection is significant for its association with professional golf in Australia, for its role in documenting the history, technicality, personality and popular culture of the game of golf, and for making this publicly accessible.*

*The collection is primarily of historic significance but is also socially significant to the many people who continue to make the sport the cornerstone of their lives - notably the amateur and professional members of the Society, distributed around Australia. The collection holds objects evidencing the inventiveness of golf club and golf ball makers, designers and testers, while nationally and internationally, significant Australian players and achievements are also represented.*

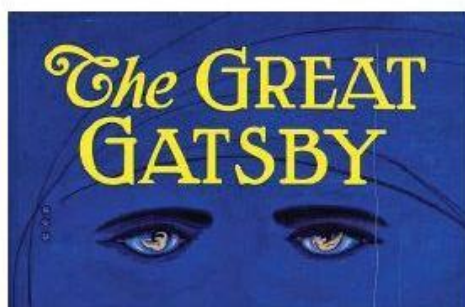
*Unique collection items of national significance include the Frank Eyre ball trophy, 1930s film footage of Donald Bradman receiving golf training, the 1960 PGA Mutual Share Certificate and the Betty Dalglish golf club collection and bag. Rare items include a Golf-Ball Testing Machine, a 'Sunshine Rebuild' golf ball, an 'Empire' club carrier, a (design failure) Nylon beaded putter design, a Slazenger wooden golf head evolution collection, a 1978 GolfTek Swing Analyzer, a Carrington Hotel showcase, a golf ball used by Norman von Nida and a 1970s Australian Ladies Golf Union uniform. In addition, many collection items or sub-collections are representative and/or have interpretive capacity. The AGHS has a small and solid bed of well-thought-through foundational and directional documents, which have served the collection well to date. Building on this foundation this Report makes eighteen recommendations for workers on the AGHS collection in the areas of Research, Targetted collecting, Management, Interpretation, Preservation and Promotion. Recommended next steps for the AGHS collection centre around fully documenting existing and incoming collection items, while developing a plan for targetted collecting consistent with its nominated title and role."*

The achievement of the completion of the Significance Assessment of the collection is a credit to the ongoing dedication and involvement of Tom Moore and more recently, in her professional capacity, Emma Williams, and to all of the volunteers and donors who have provided the exhibits and accessibility thereto. The combination of the of the Assessment and 100 Year Anniversary of the PGA in Australia in 2011 have added a new dimension to the Museum in both content and presentation with some of the items in The Museum's collection being the only examples of their type to be found in Australia. All Members are encouraged to arrange to make a visit to The Museum.

## SCOTTISH BOB GOLF CLUB SCORECARD COLLECTOR

My name is Bob Davies and I was born in Glasgow, Scotland. I arrived in Australia in 1970 and, after playing many sports - darts, rugby league, cricket, basketball and sport fishing, in 2002 I played my very first game of golf at the ripe old age of 58 at Darlington Beach Resort in N.S.W. I thought "this is the game for me", but after a couple of years passed by I soon realized that I had left my run a little late to be a class player. However, today I still enjoy playing a round of golf now and again.

While playing a round at Coffs Harbour Golf Club in 2005 a couple of my mates were cleaning out their golf bags when one of them handed me a golf club scorecard from Queensland and asked me if I would like it. As it was quite interesting to look at I kept it and thought to myself later that it could be an interesting hobby collecting golf club scorecards from around Australia. After a few months had passed I thought about trying to obtain scorecards from other countries - New Zealand being my first country - which was very successful and lo and behold I was hooked.

There were many avenues that I used to obtain my scorecards from around the world such as sending self addressed stamped envelopes, faxes and emails. If I did not receive a reply I would even contact other sporting clubs, tourism offices, tour guides and even some British Embassies to try and obtain scorecards. Of course there was always swapping scorecards with other golf club scorecard collectors from around the world, and it was a shock to me to find out just how many there are. Most of the collectors were collecting scorecards from every golf course that they could get their hands on. One of my close friends, Ian Lockhart from Dalkieth in Scotland, has about 50,000 scorecards in his collection. Christoph Meister from Hamburg in Germany, (who also has a lot to do with Hickory Golf Championships) has a fine collection. Paul Stabback, of Darlington Beach Resort, New South Wales would, I consider, have the biggest collection in Australia - about 45,000 cards. We are all good friends and I trade with them often.

In 2010, I decided to change the course of my collection. I wanted my collection to be different to anyone else's collection and also to be the first person in the world to obtain a golf club scorecard from every country and island in the world that played golf and for a scorecard from the course that is the oldest in that country. I would look at my world globe, pick a country then draft a letter. I would always start with Hello; Good Morning; How are you? and finish with Thank you very much, in their national language. For example

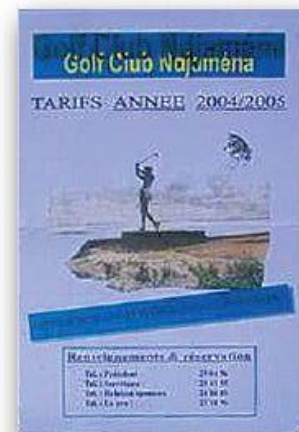


a couple of months ago I wanted to obtain the Nuuk Golf Club scorecard from Greenland and as Denmark owned Greenland for 300 years they speak Danish so I wrote to the golf club and said "God Morgan and Hvordan har du det Hej" which is hi or hello and finished with "Tusind Takk". The Nuuk golf course is the oldest in Greenland and they were kind enough to send me a scorecard and this is how I prepare all my emails and letters to Golf Clubs around the world.

Each one of my scorecards has its own unique story to tell as to how I obtained it and the lengths it took to get it. Tristan Da Cunha is a fine example. After reading about the cruise ships that called into their port and how some of the passengers played a game of golf in a cow paddock and recorded their scores on a piece of paper, I tracked down a kind South African gentleman who was in charge of their golf course. I explained to him about my collection and of the many collectors around the world who would gladly pay for a souvenir scorecard and that the ships' passengers would also be happy to keep one. After a few months he sent me an email informing me that he liked my idea and he designed a scorecard for the Tristan Da Cunha Golf Club and he kept the first scorecard printed and honored me with being second person in the world to obtain a scorecard as well as being made an honorary member of their golf club. He sent me a framed membership card which is a prized asset in my collection.



Luck also plays a big part of collecting scorecards - being in the right place at the right time. My wife came home one day from visiting one of our neighbours and, after listening to a bit of gossip she informed me that our neighbour's daughter was coming home from Chad in two weeks. I thought "I wonder if there is a golf course there". I contacted the daughter and asked if she knew if there was a golf course in Chad. Lo and behold her daughter had played there and came home with a scorecard from the N'Djamena 9 Hole desert golf course. Who would have thought that such a poor country would have a golf course.

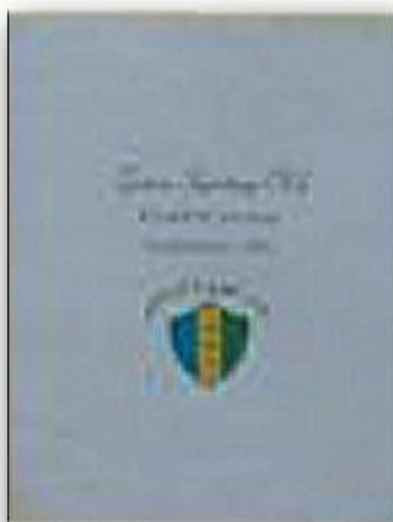


One of my most prized scorecards came from reading about a group of workers on McMurdo Station in Antarctica holding a golf competition on the ice for a bit of fun. After many emails and lots of hours trying to contact the right person, I managed to get hold of a kind American gentleman from Texas who informed me that they were going to hold a 2006 end of year golf competition, I asked him if they keep scores or have a scorecard or such and he informed me that he would make scorecards out of A4 paper and he sent me a couple, I asked him how could I thank him and he said that the school his daughter was going to were trying to obtain postcards from different parts of the world for a school project. I sent them heaps from all over the world, and I received a letter of thanks from the school kids which they had all signed. In 2007 I received a scorecard from Scott Base, Antarctica for the Ross Island Masters International Invitation with the Northern Lights on the homemade scorecard.

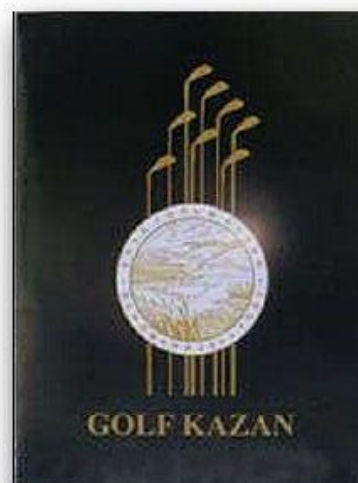




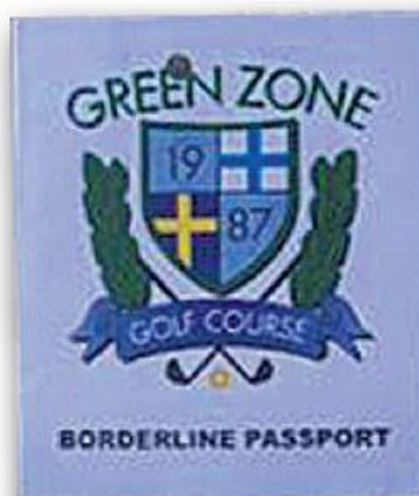
Of course it is not all plain sailing trying to obtain scorecards from golf clubs. While trying to obtain a scorecard from a golf club in Nigeria I received an email from a chap in Nigeria saying that it would cost \$25 American for a taxi to go to the golf club \$25 for the scorecard, \$25 for the taxi back and \$25 for him making it \$100 American for the scorecard. Last August, while surfing the net on golf in Benin, West Africa I read about a Charity called Kids Right to Play and it was about getting young children involved in football and giving them an interest and some self esteem, I asked the Charity if they could please try and help me to obtain a scorecard from the Marina Hotel in Cotonou which has a small 9 hole course. They said they would try and would I be willing to make a donation to their Charity. I went to some local junior football teams and asked if any of the kids would like to donate their boots to the Children in Benin. I managed to get 6 pairs of football boots in excellent condition and sent them airmail which cost me \$60. The Charity managed to send me a scorecard via email.



The very last two scorecards that I have received must also be included as jewels in my collection. The Kazan Golf Course in the Republic of Tatarstan, which was built in 2004 by the Harradine Golf Company and the Fenti Golf Club from the Sudan opened in 2010 by the Harradine Golf Company. It was Mr. Peter Harradine himself who sent both scorecards to me and his family have had a big influence in my collection.



Among my collection I have some unique courses like the Green Zone Golf Club where 9 holes are in Sweden and 9 holes are in Finland, Furnace Creek Golf Course in Death Valley which is the Lowest golf course in the world and the Highest, La Paz in Bolivia. Ko'olau Golf Course in Hawaii as the Most Challenging, and the grassless One Boat Golf Club on Ascension Island voted by the Guinness book of records as the World's worst course. St Helena Golf Course where Napoleon spent his last days, The Royal House of Windsor Golf Course, the Drambuie Ice Golf Championships held in Uummannaq Greenland, if the ice is thick enough.



I keep thinking that I will run of countries for my collection but new countries are forming all the time like Southern Sudan, Kosovo, East Timor and countries like Belarus and Georgia are now having golf courses built, so there are still a few countries to have golf courses. I am currently seeking a scorecard from any of the following golf courses La Perla Golf Course in Albania, The Laico L'Amitie Hotel 9 hole golf course in Mali, and The Nullarbor Links in Australia,

I realise that my collection would and could never have been this big and extensive without the help of hundreds of kind men and women from all over the world who have never met me but send me scorecards from golf courses they themselves have visited or played. I appreciate the kindness the golfing fraternity has shown me be it the golf professionals, designers, course architects, greenkeepers, caddies, golf collectors, golf clubs, resorts and the every day devotees of this great game of ours. Not only have I had the pleasure of obtaining the scorecards but along the way I have made many friends, learnt a few words in lots of different languages as well as improving my geography and finding out a lot more about golf. To all my friends and the people who have helped me I offer my most sincere thanks to them in helping me with my quest to become the first person in the world to obtain a golf club scorecard from every country in the world.

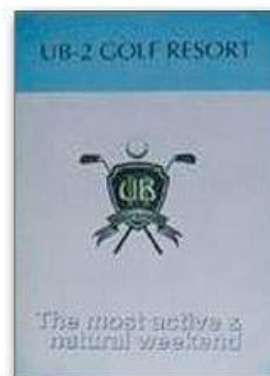
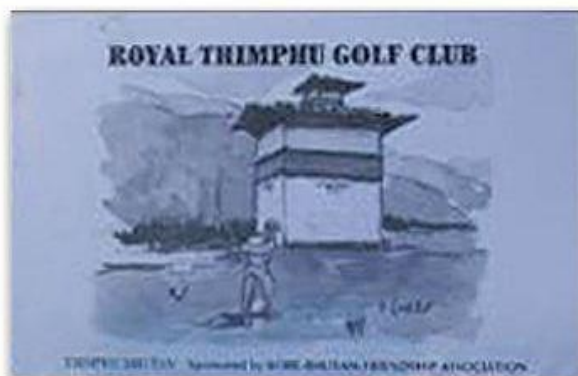
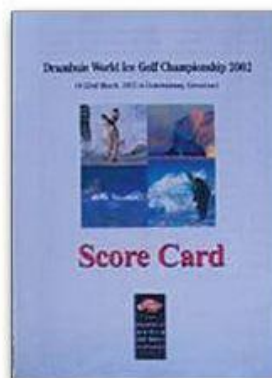

## MARCONI AND FRIENDS GO TO GOLF

It's interesting, having just had an extensive coverage of the 2012 US Open Golf Championship, to consider what was available in the period prior to television coverage. Golf was no less popular then and certainly in Great Britain there was a huge interest in the progress of The Open Championship and The Amateur Championship and The Walker Cup. The British Golf Collectors' Society journal *Through the Green*, in an article in the March 2010 edition describes the radio coverage given to golf, principally in the post war years 1946 to 1959.

At the commencement of this period the radio content was typically controlled by the BBC. A sophisticated suite of programming was presented that was designed to appeal across all audiences depending on what region you were in and providing you were prepared to move between networks. Technological breakthroughs in radio broadcasts during the period saw the development of the portable transistor and VHF transmission. There was also an existing strong demand for coverage of other sporting events such as horse racing; the Grand National and the Derby, professional boxing, cricket Test matches, football and Wimbledon.

The period between 1945 and 1960 may be viewed by many as the golden age of radio broadcasting. However, to follow the major golf events on the radio one needed to look at the daily programs carefully to ensure that you were on the right station at the right time. Generally all of the reports were short. They were a combination of summaries of play and some live commentating - if there was notable action at 18th during live air-time slots. Gradual advancements were made in the content of commentaries, in trying to cover the great expanse of the golf course, with the introduction of radio telephone services. The commentators themselves were noted golfing luminaries, not the least of whom were Bernard Darwin and Henry Longhurst. Darwin was principally pre war while Longhurst and Stewart MacPherson, subsequently to become the "*Voice of Britain*", were the main commentators at the outset of the period. Unfortunately, very few of these broadcasts survived in BBC Archives. Of those that did, by contrast Darwin's 1938 report of The Open was in the nature of a fireside chat after play had finished. MacPherson's 1948 report of The Open was live and immediate. He kept listeners in the picture reminding them of the key information - "Cotton's overall score and the number of shots he has played up the 18th" - at just the right intervals. Either way it was radio sports commentary at its best.

There is no doubt that the rudiments of the radio broadcasts paved the way for the initial television broadcasts that overlapped the radio commentaries of the period while television became more accessible to the fans.
